

BECOME AN ASSOCIATE SCHOOL

Join a groundbreaking programme and work with schools around the country to bring Shakespeare's work to life.

The Associate Schools Programme is the Royal Shakespeare Company's long-term partnership programme with 16 theatres and over 250 state-maintained primary and secondary schools across England.

It uses the combination of Shakespeare's work and RSC teaching approaches to improve learning outcomes for children and young people.

Alongside transformational continuing professional development for teachers, the programme includes unique opportunities for students in performance, leadership and career development.

In Kent, the programme includes schools from all across the region arranged into two cluster groups. Each cluster will include experienced schools who have been in the programme for several years as well as new schools. Five of these schools will bring a wealth of experience to the programme and will act as mentor schools, offering support in their specialist areas of primary education, secondary education, and special educational needs.

Get involved

We are recruiting primary, secondary and special schools to join our cluster as Associate Schools.

The programme focuses on schools and communities in areas of structural disadvantage, i.e. areas that are disadvantaged by the way resources are allocated and are under-served by the arts and cultural sector.

To be eligible for the Associate Schools Programme, we are looking for **state-maintained schools** who ideally have **above the national average** of students eligible for Free School Meals.

We expect Associate Schools to:

- Commit to engage fully for a minimum of two years;
- Nominate at least two teachers that will lead the programme in their school;
- Be fully supported by senior management and school governors.

The programme is most suitable for secondary English and Drama teachers and primary teachers (especially those who may be the Literacy Lead).

- Take part in local and national performance festivals of work by young people.
- Take part in student leadership programmes.
- Access opportunities for students interested in a career in theatre.
- Work with RSC practitioners and practitioners from the Marlowe Theatre.

What is the impact?

We have undertaken research to measure the impact of the Associate Schools Programme on learning outcomes for children and young people.

Our latest research study, Time to Act, makes a direct link between RSC approaches to teaching Shakespeare and improvements in language development, specifically in writing, as well as developments in the emotional and social skills of children and young people.
